

### SUPERINTENDENT CORNER

As I write this article another school year has come and gone and my time back here at Hesperia is once again coming to an end. The district has selected a permanent replacement that will be taking over in July. Mr. Vaughn White comes to Hesperia from Kingsley, where he has been serving as the middle school principal for the past four years. Prior to that,



Mr. White was the middle school principal in Shelby for fourteen years. Vaughn has a wealth of experience as a school administrator and he has already begun making the transition from his current position to the superintendency here by spending a day each week in the district getting acquainted with staff and working with the building principals and the central office staff. I believe this will provide valuable insight on where the district is currently and help develop a collective vision for where it needs to go moving forward.

The past five months have been challenging and rewarding for me; Hesperia, like most districts, is struggling financially due to rising operational costs and shrinking enrollment. In an effort to minimize the impact of our enrollment decline we are making budget reductions in an effort to ensure the district is right sized to continue serving our students and keep us financially stable. I believe we have a plan in place that will accomplish this and give Vaughn a solid base to work from.

As always, when we look at areas to save money we look at options that will have the least amount of impact on the quality of instruction we provide to our students. Although this is becoming increasingly difficult I believe our plan makes sense fiscally and meets the district's goal of maintaining a quality educational program for students.

I'd like to close by sharing that when I was asked to come back and fill in for this period of time I did so because my previous experience as superintendent here had been the most rewarding time in my career. The past five months have reinforced my fondness for Hesperia, the staff, students, parents and community as a whole have been wonderful to work with and I appreciate the support they have given me. With that being said, it's time for me to stop; I'm starting to sound like a sentimental old guy getting ready to retire again, I guess maybe l am.

## Middle/High School Principal Message

#### 2016 M-STEP Testing

During the spring of the 2014-2015 school year our students participated in the first year of Michigan State Test for Educational Progress (M-STEP) testing. M-STEP is the new name for Michigan state assessments, previously known as the MEAP. During the spring our students

completed assessments for English and language arts (ELA), math, science, and social studies. Math and ELA were assessed in third through eighth grades and eleventh grade; social studies was assessed in the fifth, eighth, and eleventh grades; and science was assessed at the fourth, seventh, and eleventh grades. One significant change in last year's testing was the addition of performance tasks in ELA and math and the fact that these tests were all delivered in an online format for the first time.

There have been some major changes to the assessment requirements during the 2015-2016 school year. First of all, our eleventh grade students will have taken the SAT instead of the ACT. State law requires our eleventh grade students to be assessed using a college readiness assessment, and the Michigan Department of Education selected the SAT to replace the ACT to satisfy that requirement. Additionally, the ELA performance task assessment in fifth and eighth grades is being reduced and eliminated at the third, fourth, sixth, and seventh grade levels, and the class activity for the ELA and Math performance tasks were eliminated. Lastly, eleventh grade students will not take a Michigan component for math and ELA, as the SAT and WorkKeys were determined to be adequate for those subjects. These two changes helped to reduce assessment time by one to three hours per grade.

Michigan has also been in the process of satisfying the law requirement that includes ninth and tenth grade assessments, so this spring our ninth and tenth grade students were required to take the PSAT. Although this requirement is new for the state, in Hesperia we have been testing ninth and tenth grade students for several years. In the past we have given these students the PLAN assessment, which was the ACT's pre-ACT assessment and served as a predictor of success for the ACT. The PSAT is the SAT equivalent assessment which the state is paying for, and it is similar to what students have experienced in the past.

The teachers and staff in Hesperia Community Schools have worked diligently to successfully equip all students to perform to the best of their abilities on state and national assessments as we better prepare all students for eventual College and Career Readiness.

19 Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors registered to take Advanced Placement Literature & Composition tests, Friday, May 20th, at the Hesperia Public Library. Students that earn a 3,4, or 5 (1-5 Scale) on these assessments qualify for scholarships and College/Career Credits, saving parents and families thousands of dollars in tuition and fees. In preparation, 15 of our students participated in a full three and a half hour Saturday AP practice test last month.

The Middle School All "A" breakfast was held Wednesday, May 11th with the high school all "A" breakfast on, Wednesday, May 18th.

Our Second Annual "Swing Out," senior class send off took place on Friday, May 27th at 9:30 am in the high school gymnasium. This is a K-12 celebration with all students and staff in the district in attendance, many of whom have active roles in the ceremony.

A drum corps processional for the senior class, outfitted in their decorated caps and gowns, followed by a faculty and staff processional to, "In The Mood", written by Glenn Miller in the 1940's, and performed by our instrumental music department started the ceremony. Elementary students gave their special goodbye to the seniors. Students and staff received a variety of awards, a senior class slide show, special music, a staff skit, college and career declaration day and other activities, followed by the senior class recessional through the "staff tunnel," to conclude the ceremony. All parents and community members were invited to attend.

The HS Band marched and played in the Memorial Day parade and ceremony in the downtown pavilion. They also played for Graduation. All instrumental students will be playing and marching in the July 4th celebration and parade this summer.

There are numerous band students who have received scholarships to attend Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp this summer. Fourteen students so far, have sent in their registrations and plan to attend this 12 day international camp.

They are to be filed no later than Tuesday, July 26, 2016 at 4:00 p.m. The last day for a candidate to withdraw their petition is Friday, July 29, 2016 at 4:00 p.m. Qualified and registered electors of Hesperia Community School district are eligible to place their name on the November 8, 2016 ballot by filing a petition bearing the required number of legal signatures of the district's registered voters (a \$100.00 nonrefundable fee may be filed in lieu of a petition.). Hesperia Community School District has four (4) school board positions consisting of two 6-year terms that will expire in 2022 and one 4-year term of office that will expire in 2020 and one 2-year term of office that will expire in 2018.

### **SPEED OF SOUND THROUGH AIR**

This spring our physics students set out to prove the speed of sound through air. The 10th – 12th graders in Mrs. Sherburn's physics class knew that the textbook stated sound travels at 343 meters per second (1,125 ft/sec) but were challenged with designing an experiment to prove the rate of sound travel. All students decided to conduct their experiment outdoors and stand as far apart as possible. In most cases, one student stood with a material that would be highly visible from a distance and make a loud noise, such as two blocks of wood or a pair of cymbals. Students learned very quickly that the further they stood apart, the more accurate their time measurements. Mrs. Sherburn said, "All of our students have experienced seeing lightning before hearing the corresponding thunder but it was really interesting to actually see two objects clapped together and then experiencing the distinctive delay. I was impressed by their experimental design, percent error and reflection on improvements." We also had an interesting class discussion on how temperature impacts the speed of sound. Half of the class thought colder temperatures would make sound travel faster because gas particles are closer together, whereas, the other half reasoned that sound will travel faster in warmer temperatures. The latter half of the class was correct, the increased energy of the particles, plays a much bigger role in determining the speed of sound.




