### Hesperia Community Schools Receives Performance Based Bonus

Hesperia Community Schools was informed by the Michigan Department of Education that it was one of only fourteen districts in the state to receive the full performance based bonus for 2013-2014. The concept for "bonus" funding for schools originated in 2011 through an agreement between State Superintendent, Mike Flanagan, and Governor Snyder. The final bill was signed in July 2012, included many revisions, and was added to the budget for 2013-2014.

The requirement for attaining the additional funding is based primarily on student growth and improvement, not solely on student proficiency. The intent is to provide incentives for districts who achieve student growth. All districts in Michigan are eligible to receive this performance based bonus, which has a maximum of \$100 per student. Districts can earn all or a portion of this funding, based on student performance and divided as follows:

\$30 for mathematics in elementary and middle schools \$30 for reading in elementary and middle schools \$40 for all tested subjects in the high school

Hesperia Community Schools received the entire amount for 2013-2014. "We are extremely proud of our district and the academic growth achieved over the past few years." said Jeffery Haase, Superintendent.

### New Technology for Elementary Students

Patricia St. Clair Elementary has been awarded a grant from Great Lakes Energy to purchase an electronic interactive white board. The white board will be installed in the

computer lab and used by all elementary teachers and students.

This new technology will enable students to learn in an engaging way by being able to manipulate the subject that they are studying. Color graphics, audio and video accentuate learning with a 3D type of experience for all learners.

Hesperia Community Schools is grateful to Great Lakes Energy Cooperative for the opportunity to purchase new technology for our elementary school students.







# Superintendent's Message

With the transition to the Common Core State Standards and the next generation assessments, Hesperia Community Schools has developed a District Literacy Plan with the primary focus to prepare students for the challenges of college and career readiness in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Over the past 10 months a team of teachers, support staff, business leaders, community leaders and parents have met monthly to review, discuss and develop the District Literacy Plan.

This initiative is based on the "Taking Action Literacy Leadership Model" that was developed through a project funded by the Carnegie Corporation. The model is designed to answer "What

do literacy leaders need to do to successfully improve student literacy and learning in all grades?"

Literacy is far more than basic reading, as the Common Core calls on districts to ensure students can read, write and speak at much higher levels. Additionally, all students are now required to read, analyze and produce graphs, charts, pictures, maps, images and words in both fiction and nonfictional texts from a very young age.

Literacy is the KEY to academic success in all content areas and essential for all students of Hesperia Community Schools. It is our responsibility to prepare every student for college or career readiness prior to their high school graduation.

This committee has spent countless hours looking at the current state of literacy within our district, developing a vision, formulating improvement goals, creating action steps, and developing systems to monitor success and expectations for Hesperia Community Schools. This District Literacy Plan will provide a path for our district to follow throughout the next three years.

### **Readers on the Prowl**



Parents and staff members from Hesperia Community Schools have collaborated to create the **Readers on the Prowl** mobile library. The purpose of this initiative is to provide a summer literacy opportunity for students within Hesperia. **Readers on the Prowl** will provide children easy access to books, hopefully result in a reduced summer reading loss, increase student achievement and create an excitement for literacy.

Between first and sixth grades, children can experience the equivalent of 1.5 years of reading development set-back if they are not exposed to books (Cooper, Nye, Charlton, Lindsay and Greathouse). Research has found that reading as little as four or five books during the summer has the potential to prevent a decline in reading achievement and that reading books was the only activity consistently related to summer learning (Kim, 2004). Additionally, we hope **Readers on the Prowl** will enhance the students' excitement

for literacy. School personnel and parent volunteers will travel in the mobile library and children will have the opportunity to earn incentives each time they visit. **Readers on the Prowl** will be available to all children regardless of age or school affiliation.

The start-up costs for refurbishing the bus are estimated to be approximately \$15,000. The cost to purchase books for the bus is estimated to be \$5,000. Once **Readers on the Prowl** is created, we will have annual operating costs, which will include a driver, bus maintenance and fuel, additional books and an annual yearend celebration. Grants and tax-free community donations are being sought, and book collection boxes will be available in local businesses. A donation level was created in order to recognize community donors on the outside of the mobile library for two years. Donation levels and decal information include:

# High School and Middle School News

Since our first day of school in September, both middle and high school students and staff have maintained a fast and steady pace leading into our Holiday break! There have been many events and activities this Fall semester that have provided students with positive memories for this 2013-14 school year.

At both the middle and high school, we have initiated a Student Advisory Council that meets I-2 times per month for the purpose of increasing student voice in the overall operation of our schools. All students have the opportunity to participate in this activity following

initial student signups back in September for high school and in October for middle school students. Students that participate are able to do so for about two months at which time a different group of 24-30 students begins. Prior to the start of a new group, all students will once again be able to sign up in the main offices. There has never been a need to set an agenda for these meetings as students are consistently open, honest and enthusiastic in their feelings and opinions on how we can make improvements to student life. This variety and diversity of input will add to students feeling more connected to their school environment and to a better functioning school.



Much work is being accomplished by both our middle school and high school, school improvement teams. These staff members have contributed much time and effort in working toward making our secondary schools a more challenging and rewarding experience for the students we serve. I am encouraged that focused conversations are taking place regarding curriculum and instruction as well as policies and operational procedures.



Since September, we have observed late start Wednesday's. These are great opportunities for faculty and staff to collaborate on curriculum and teaching strategies as well as for students to sleep in a bit! Our efforts this year have focused on instructional staff working in departments and at grade levels on curriculum alignment and mapping strategies. The completion of this current horizontal curriculum work has been accomplished. Starting in January, 2014, both middle and high school instructional staff will combine for the purpose of identifying a vertical curriculum path as students move from grade level to grade level with a focus, not only on high school completion, but on preparation for college and the daily work force.

In just a few short months, I have observed students in both our middle and high schools that feel safe and accepted in their day to day activities, are involved and contributing in classrooms and at co-curricular events. I have worked with students that are respectful and cooperative with each other and with those teaching and supervising them. In those challenging times, I have observed learning opportunities for students, staff and parents through conversations that lead to a better understanding of how we can make Hesperia secondary schools a better experience for all. Thank you students, staff and parents for welcoming me as your secondary schools principal.

Our teaching staff has been work diligently during delayed starts to finish their Curriculum Maps based on the Common Core. These maps will allow teachers as well as stakeholders to have the entire curriculum viewable in an easy to use document. In addition, our student achievement data continues to show growth. Our students are making great strides and closing gaps every day.

We have implemented a new literacy program to support student comprehension entitled Making Meaning. Many of the students and teachers are enjoying the Making Meaning books and activities. We hope to have a recommendation from our Math Resource committee for new materials by the end of the school year. These materials will be an aligned program for math K-5 and be fully aligned to Common Core. These are both exciting curriculum initiatives.

Positive Behavior Support and Intervention is a program we are working on fully implementing by the Fall of 14'. PBS will add common language and expectations to our behavior management for students; while rewarding them for following expectations with incentives and positive feedback. It is an exciting and enriching time to be a part of St. Clair Elementary. Patricia St. Clair Elementary is a great place to go to school. It is also a great place to work. Our staff is made up of kind, generous, and tremendously caring Individuals. I am proud to work here and I am very


