Baker College Partnership

Beginning this winter Hesperia Community Schools will begin a partnership with Baker College, as prospective teachers will complete required fieldwork experiences in our buildings. Hesperia Community Schools is the only district in the West Michigan area to enter into

such a partnership with the Baker College Education Department. The intent of this experience is to provide prospective educators with the opportunity to have direct contact with students, teachers, administrators and other school personnel in a variety of learning environments. Baker students will be placed throughout the K-I2 educational setting in order to provide multiple experiences.

MEEMIC Grant

Congratulations to Mrs. Vonda Hall on being chosen for this year's MEEMIC Book Grant. The MEEMIC Foundation for the Future of Education awarded Mrs. Hall \$478.80 to use towards the purchase of books for Hesperia Community Schools. The grant was written to not only make more books available to students, but also to add variety to boy gender books and increase interest in reading. The books will be a great addition to the elementary library and we would like to thank Mrs. Hall for pursuing this grant.



The Host Home Program at Webster House Youth Services offers short term, temporary shelter to youth in crisis within homes in their own community. Webster House is in need of families who are willing to open their homes to teens who are in desperate need of help. The length of stay would not exceed two weeks and a daily stipend is provided for families who participate in the program.

When you decide to host a teen, Webster House Youth Services will support you throughout the entire process. Training will be provided to help you understand teens in crisis and tools will be given so that participants will learn how to be an effective host family. Licensing is required, but is free of charge. Host Homes give teens a safe alternative in communities where shelters are not available.

Many teens are currently living on the streets or couch surfing, as an alternative to staying at a shelter outside their own community. Living on the streets is unsafe and sometimes forces youth to engage in survival activities they would not pursue if living in a safe home environment. 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Superintendent's Message

If you haven't already, you will be hearing news reports about revised "cut scores" recently adopted by the Michigan State Board of Education for the Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) and the Michigan Merit Exam (MME). Rather than relying on the news media, I encourage you to look to Hesperia Community Schools and the Michigan Department of Education for the most accurate and current information.

Each year all public school students in Grades 3-9 are required to take the MEAP and all high school juniors must take the MME. The "cut scores" for the MEAP and MME separate students taking the

exams into four categories: Advanced, Proficient, Partially Proficient and Not Proficient. Previously, the "cut scores" for these exams in Michigan were set at a very basic level. Under the new scoring system, students will have to correctly answer a much higher percentage of questions to be considered "Proficient". These new "cut scores" not only

represent a significantly higher standard for student achievement, they are also intended to more accurately reflect a student's progress towards college and career readiness.

Michigan is one of only three states in the nation (along with New York and Tennessee) to make the change to this top tier level of scoring. When the MEAP and MME proficiency results are released next spring a significant decline in scores for all districts throughout Michigan is expected. While this drop in the number of students reported as "Proficient" is expected, I am confident that this will be temporary as Hesperia Community Schools continues our efforts for ongoing school improvement and student support.

The MEAP and MME exams are just two of several measures used by Hesperia Community Schools throughout the year to ensure that students are making academic progress. Instructional staff is currently working on aligning our curriculum to the Common Core State Standards and this will be posted to the district website next summer. Additionally, delayed start days provide an opportunity to offer professional development so staff is equipped to meet the changing educational needs of our students. Hesperia Community Schools will continue to maintain high standards and do whatever is necessary to prepare our students for college and careers.

High School Principal Notes

Wow! Where has the school year gone? It is hard to believe that, as I sit down to write this message, snowflakes are in the air and the chilly winds of winter are upon us. It seems that only a short time ago we were returning to school with the hope and promise of a safe, rewarding and productive experience for all. As we have progressed through the first half of the school year, our staff and students have accomplished much and have much of which to be proud.

In the area of academics we continue to make great strides. Our students are choosing to challenge themselves like never before with record numbers of them taking challenging courses such as chemistry, physics, pre-calculus and Advanced Placement English. Weekly writing assignments have been infused into all classes in an attempt to help our students reach a deeper understanding of the content and improve our ACT/MME test scores in the spring. The science department has implemented weekly exercises to improve students' problem solving and data analysis skills. Our teaching staff has also been hard at work aligning and mapping curriculum in order to better serve our students. Our collective efforts are paying off. Just as the school year began, Hesperia High School received the great news that in the Michigan Department of Education's top-to-bottom rankings of all the schools in Michigan, we were ranked in the 71st percentile. That was the highest ranking of any high school in the county or surrounding area.

It has also been a very successful fall athletically. Our football program had its most successful season in five years and seems poised to build on that success next season. The boys' cross country team also had an excellent year, winning the Conference title and running to an impressive sixth-place finish at the State Meet. They also had the fine distinction of having the highest team grade-point average of any Division 4 team in the State. The highlight of the fall athletic season, however, belonged to our girls' cross country team as they ran to a State Championship for the second straight year. The girls ran through the season undefeated and dominated the State Meet where their 40-point margin of victory was the largest of the day in all classes. Our winter athletic seasons are off to a promising start with the highest participation numbers we have had in years.

We have also had many other exciting, informative and enriching activities take place at Hesperia High School this year. A number of our classes have hosted guest speakers who have provided information for our students on career opportunities in the arts, sciences and social sciences. A group of science students traveled to Grand Rapids to attend a symposium on careers in medicine and health care. Parent-teacher conferences saw their largest turnout in many years. To celebrate the coming of the Holiday season, our band and performing arts class recently hosted its annual Christmas concert and bazaar. Also in the



Holiday spirit, our staff and students recently participated in a canned food drive, and the staff purchased and delivered holiday food baskets.

We are very proud of the efforts and accomplishments of our entire Hesperia High School community and believe there are many great things to come. On behalf of our students, staff and administration I would like to thank everyone for their continued support of our efforts and wish you a joyful Holiday season.

Middle School News

It has been a very busy start to the school year. We hit the ground running in September. Our students have had several field trips already this year. Our fifth grade students went to Scottville for the Old Engine field trip. We completed MEAP testing in October. Following the testing, all the middle school students made the trip to Camp Pinewood for the fun, hands-on learning that the camp offers. All the students, teachers and chaperones reported having a great time. The weather cooperated very nicely this year. The trip this year was funded in part by The Fremont Area Community Foundation; Robert Gustine Fund. Thank you to FACF for your continued support of our students and their education.

We have implemented a new technological piece for writing. Write Source is a technology based tool for students to use for writing. The program is quite unique in its features and the students seem to really like it. The more teachers and students are acquainted with this new piece of technology, the more you will be hearing about it.

The teachers and students have been hard at work this first marking period. The Engineering class built steam engines. The 7th Grade Writing Class wrote metaphorical poems, and the 6th Grade Spanish class did a project labeling the parts of the body in Spanish. All of these classroom activities were presented to the board of education at the regular November board meeting. All students in their Seminar classes wrote "Thank you" letters to the men and women in our Armed Forces serving over seas. They will be sent overseas to arrive just in time for Thanksgiving.

The Science Courtyard is another classroom for our students. They have the opportunity to work in a "real", hands-on, learning environment. The science teachers utilize this educational forum for our students to experience nature, to see and learn how things grow. With the teachers, they have planted and cultivated everything growing in the courtyard. In the Spring, we will add the walk way material and benches made from recycled material. The Science Courtyard has been made possible through grants that our teachers have written.

This fall we made some changes in the way that Seminar period is utilized. It seems to have made quite a difference in the number of student success stories. Our students can get help from teachers, make up tests, retake tests and do correctives, among other things two days a week during Seminar time. The remaining days of the week are used for reading and intramurals. Students still receive a Seminar grade for the books that they read.

The Social Studies classes decorated the main hallway for Veteran's Day. They reprinted the story of the Poppy Field in France and covered the walls with Poppy flowers. It turned out beautiful. Please feel free to stop by and check it out some time.

Parent Involvement

Hesperia Community School Improvement Team has made it a priority to increase Parent and Community Involvement in our district. One key goal is to foster collaboration between the school, parents and our local community. It is impossible for

schools to close the achievement gap without a dynamic partnership with families. Research has demonstrated that engaging families in their child's education improves student achievement, attendance, behavior and increases graduation rates.

We will have several events during the 2011-2012 school year that will provide an opportunity for families and the local community to become involved in the educational process of our students. Thank you for the important role you play in the success of the students, school and community.

Every day is full of adventures from learning about measurement to George Washington to the process of photosynthesis. This program is designed for students to set up an avatar and progress through the writing process while learning about grammar and writing structures. Both of these programs are used with students at school in the classrooms and computer labs as well as being accessible from home.
